Background of the AASRAA Trust

Aasraa Trust was established as a social work trust focusing on education of underprivileged children in 2009, in response to a crisis for intervention for the welfare of children from the riverbed slum under the Bindal Bridge. Aasraa then worked with the river bed community to promote the need for education and started an after school project to augment school education. This project was originally housed alongside the riverbed.

It was then invited to use the classrooms in Dehradun's leading school, St Joseph's Academy. Aasraa is now working with a Delhi based Trust, Aman for All, to run this project on a larger scale with better amenities for the children. It is called 'Wings of Doon'. This allegory is based on caring for fledgling birds; nurturing them, giving them the skills and confidence to spread their wings and soar into the sky.

In 2011, again, in response to a crisis; the growing number of children living on the streets of Dehradun, Aasraa Trust started its second project, 'Street Smart'.

This project aims to provide basic literacy and vocational skills for street children. The ultimate objective of this program is to create a business for these children in which they can work in safety with dignity. Street Smart is housed at Rein Basera, a shelter run The Doon Shelters Society for the Homeless. It also works in collaboration with JOYN India to train these children in the skilled art of textile block printing. Computer literacy is essential in today's world. A computer centre at Rein Basera for training all the children of the Aasraa Trust.

Aasraa Trust has a team of dedicated young teachers who mentor and care for the children. This care ranges from educational support to medical needs; from hygiene to clothing; from drug counseling to nutrition, the aim and objective of the Trust is to love, nurture and educate children from socio-economically deprived backgrounds. The Trust is governed by a board of trustees with backgrounds in education, de-addiction and social work.

In the words of the Chairman



It is gratifying to see the effect we have on the children in our care. We are not a school; here at Aasraa attendance is voluntary. Children are not forced to come to us; they come of their own free will and desire to learn. From as young as four years, it is their own choice to come; and come, they do!

Our only stipulation is that if they do attend, then they must do so daily. In all our programs, the children are regular... out of choice.

Aasraa trust's goal is to work with children, to inspire them, teach them, and guide them, not only in terms of lettering, but making positive choices about their own lives and being aware of themselves and the space around them. Self respect is a concept very important to us. Without self respect one cannot respect others. Confidence is also integral to the growth of the child. We help these children find their voices and be responsible.

The year was extraordinary as we reached out to more and more children. Our teachers went out onto the streets and identified another area, Kanwali Road, full of neglected children not going to school; begging, rag picking or just plain truant and ready prey for bad influences such as thieving or drug taking.

We have added programs for children at the Shiv Sena Centre at Kanwali for younger children from 9am to 12 noon, a bus from Kanwali that brings older children into the shelter from 9.30am to 4pm and an after school project at the Unnayan Trust Shiksha Kendra also at Kanwali for non school going children. We will main stream as many of these children as we can, but for many, age specific education is no longer possible.



Mission


The mission of Aasraa Trust is dedicated to providing opportunity and education to children from underprivileged backgrounds.

Vision

Our vision is to give them a dream and then help them realize it.

Our idea of making a difference

Aasraa Trust is concerned with the lack of educational opportunity available to children of the poorer sections of society. We are seeking to redress this imbalance and give as many children as possible a chance to spread their wings and fly. We will mentor them, support them and give them confidence...

Recap YEAR 2009 -2010



Aasraa trust was registered in March 2009 by launching its first project ‘The Bindal Project’.

This project was originally situated on the banks of the Bindal, next to Bindal Bridge, in Dehra-Dun, working with children of migrant labourers and rag pickers living on the river beds. The main focus of this project was basic literacy combined with supplementary education.

This was a daily 2 hour program (Monday – Saturday). Bananas on arrival; milk with Bournvita on leaving, Bindal had over 80 children in regular attendance attended by 8 staff and teachers. After six months of running the projects, a seamstress was hired to teach some of the mothers sewing and stitching. This was done for two reasons – one to provide sustenance to the families of the Bindal Slum by imparting skills training to the mothers, second to make these mothers stitch clothes for these children.



Recap YEAR 2010 -2011

(Launch of Street Smart)



The official inauguration of Street Smart took place in January 2011, though we had started working with the street children around the Astley Hall area two months prior to that in November 2010.

Street Smart is located in the centre of Dehradun and works with children who live on the street and rag pick and beg for a living. The original focus of this project was art therapy and basic literacy.

For 6 months Aasraa worked on the streets, getting to know the children and building their trust levels. Then with the onset of monsoon rains we were able move the program indoors.

Street Smart welcomed the use of a night shelter, Rehan Basera, for its program. There is an immaculate washroom and water for the children to bathe and wash their clothes; a huge gleaming hall and computer room where they study and train.

In this time, the children study computers, English and Mathematics. Their medical needs are seen to, lunch and tea is served, games are played and computer training imparted.



Recap YEAR 2010 -2011

Launch of Wings of Doon



When permission to use the space at Bindal was withdrawn, we created a 'Summer Camp' in Kowlagarh, on Panchayat ground, and transported 70 children daily from Bindal to Kowlagarh village. The village children joined this program too. Our daily attendance was 250 kids.

We were looking for a new place to conduct classes for these children. Fortunately, we got the kind permission from Brother George to use classrooms at St. Joseph's Academy. Here we launched our after school program 'Wings of Doon'. A bus was hired to facilitate children in taking them to school and back.

The after school project, 'Wings', at St Joseph's Academy includes tuition in English Maths and Computers; drama, sport, art and music. The children come from Bindal Slum, neighboring slums, 'bastis' and a residential Government school, Purva Madhamik Vidyalaya on Rajpur Road, catering to the severely economically and socially challenged. This is a two hour program, Monday to Friday, 4.30pm to 6.30pm.



Wings of Doon

The after school project, 'Wings', at St Joseph's Academy, currently has 250 children, including over 60 from the Bindal slum on a bus we have provided. We now include tuition in English Maths and Computers; drama, sport, art and music. The children come from neighboring slums, 'bastis' and a residential Government school, Purva Madhamik Vidyalaya on Rajpur Road, catering to the severely economically and socially challenged. This is a two hour program, Monday to Friday, 4.30pm to 6.30pm.

We strongly believe that children cannot study on an empty stomach so we provide milk, vitamins, bananas and biscuits every day. The intention of this program is not just to educate, but to character build and allow the children to gain confidence.

We support children residing at the Purva Madhyamik Vidyalaya, as they are from severely deprived backgrounds. In addition, this school has helped us in main streaming our street children and a couple of children who were earlier begging on the streets of Dehradun, are now students at the school.

Aasraa's ethos has been to work with other equally committed nonprofit organizations so as to maximize its outreach and ability to educate and train children. Currently, the Wings program works in collaboration with St Joseph's Academy who have provided space on their campus for this after school tutorial project to run.

Similarly, the Street Smart project has been able to thrive thanks to the kindness of the Doon Shelters Society for the Homeless. Until we are able to obtain a land grant from the government to build our own shelter, they have opened their doors of the Rein Basera to our children. This is an immaculate facility with many amenities. State Bank of India has even added solar water heating and kind donors a computer room and Max India Foundation, new computers for our children. JOYN India, an American nonprofit group, works in collaboration with us to train the children in block printing and sewing. Children above the age of 14 are under training and studying. Children under the age of 14 are part of the literacy program. We work with Childline, a crisis management team for children in distress on our outreach program.

Street Smart

Street Smart is located in the centre of Dehradun and works with children who live on the streets and rag pick and beg for a living. The original focus of this project was art therapy and basic literacy. The scope and depth of this project has increased tenfold since the start of the program. There are currently **250 children** in this project.

Street Smart functions from 3 locations – Rein Basera (9am -6pm); Kanwali Road (9.30am – 12.30pm) and Unnain Shiksha Kendra (2.30pm – 4.30pm) For 6 months Aasraa worked on the streets, getting to know the children and building their trust levels. Then with the onset of monsoon rains we were able move the program indoors.

Street Smart welcomed the use of this shelter for its program. There is an immaculate washroom and water for the children to bathe and wash their clothes; a huge gleaming hall and computer room where they study and train.

For the older children, Street Smart is running a vocational training program to discourage begging and encourage learning a skill, how to run a business, self reliance and independence. This in turn will remove young people from the dangers associated with street life. We are working with a designer of ethnic products, JOYN India to train our children in crafts and will establish a market for their goods. They are currently training the older children how to block print on paper and textiles and work with master for sewing technique. The intention is to create a business into which these children can grow and be part of society and not remain marginalized.

The team in place is caring and nurturing. The children feel this is a safe haven for them. The full programme runs daily from Monday to Friday and the vocational trainees are at the shelter 7 days a week.

In this time, the children study computers, English and Mathematics. Their medical needs are seen to, lunch and tea are served, games are played and they train.

We have two ultimate aims for this program; one, to build our own shelter so these children will not have to return to the streets; two, to build a successful, self sustaining business which will be run by the trainees.

Transforming Lives

Chandni

Chandni is a 10 year old girl. She is handicapped with one leg and one hand. She used to sit on the corner of Darshanlal Chowk to beg and earns the livelihood for her entire family. She has been a part of Street Smart program for the last year, gradually increasing the time spent at the shelter. We have finally managed to place her into the residential bridge course program at the Purva Madhyamik Vidyalay. She is now in the hostel and has started her new life studying and playing with children of her own age. AASRAA has in turn employed her mother to help the family earn a living away from begging.

Sunita

Sunita is about 10 and a half. No one knows for sure; her parents died when she was around 4. She and her brother Raj Kumar lived with their aunt and uncle until they ran away from abuse. They were living in the corridors of Astley Hall. She started sniffing glue when she was 8. Sunita is no longer living on the street. It's a year and a half she was with the Street Smart program. It's not been an easy road to recovery and we take every day, one day at a time, but she is winning. In January of this year she took a turn for the worse and we were desperate to remove her from the influences of street life. Now she lives on the premises of a trust aided residential school, sponsored by AASRAA Trust. She is also a part of our wings Program.

Communication: Drama, Puppet & music



Ram Lal is the Pied Piper of Dehra Dun. Where he walks, children follow. He comes from long line of street theatre artists and is a puppet master. His rapport with the children is extraordinary. He uses theatre and puppetry to bring out not only their life stories, but to deal with contemporary issues as well. These range from the environment & governance to abuse, alcohol and drug, physical and emotional. At Wings, we are using theatre as a medium to encourage self expression and build character and self confidence. Many children want a good education. They suffer from an inferiority complex about their lack of money, their caste, the lack of opportunity. So he uses the medium of stories, poems, and songs to build their self confidence. For e.g. a song: **“ANANT VYOM MAIN JARA NAZAR UTHA KE DEKH LE”**, means the whole world is yours, you just want food and shelter; you should yearn for more than that; and you need to understand your mind and body. His work with the children includes theatre, puppetry, music and counseling. The children have relationship issues with their parents; some are addicted to drinking, tobacco & inhalers. He interacts & counsels the children about their problems and tries to instill self confidence in them.

Melody Murray and her team of wonderful young people have dedicated their time, energy and resources to create a business for these street kids. From block printed paper to textile printing,



Stitching

JOYN India has trained our young adults in the art of printing and now stitching. They have designed products, sampled them and now work with our trainees on the back of client order flow. Our dream is to create a sustainable business into which our trainees can graduate and eventually earn for themselves.



Key Achievements

- Initially we started with an outreach into the different streets and slums of Dehradun to find the street children and try to know their backgrounds, problems and interests. Our team has played a significant role in communicating with these children and in building their trust. These efforts lead to the inauguration of the Street Smart program with 20 children. Now Street Smart has gone beyond 250 children with its various activities.
- We have mainstreamed Sunita, 14 years old, who had been begging on the streets ever since the age of five. Chandini, 12 years old, a double amputee was begging on the busiest intersection of Dehradun for the last 6 years. She was the chief earning member of her family. After counseling the family and Chandini, we have now managed to admit her to a residential school.
- Most of our children were on whitener solution, 'gutka' and alcohol. We have managed to wean all away from whitener and most of them are no longer addicted to 'gutka'.
- Our vocational training program facilitated by JYON India is also growing sturdily. We have 14 trainees in the program. Now they understand the significance of education, they are keen to learn and gradually improving their skills. It is really difficult to enroll the older children into formal education due to the age factor as well as their lack of interest in formal education. Our Street Smart program is giving these children an opportunity to learn and also earn through vocational programs. AASRAA Trust is also determined to make them a part of formal education and trying to mainstream them via the NIOS route.
- 'Wings of Doon' is also facilitating around 200 students in their studies; one can see the difference in their academic performance as well as behavior, confidence and participation in different activities.
- Aasraa has started a small night shelter for some of its most vulnerable children in March 2013. We need a land grant from the Government to build a shelter to accommodate more street children to protect them from the negative influences of the street.





Advocacy Initiatives

- **Main streaming the non school going children**

The ultimate goal of AASRAA's endeavors through its Street Smart Program is to bring the street and other underprivileged children into mainstream education. It is really a difficult task to take the street children into formal education directly. Our Street Smart Program is designed to bring the children into the learning and playing atmosphere with progressive learning methods, develop an interest towards learning and then enroll them into schools.

- **Re continuation of studies for dropouts and non school going adults through NIOS**

There are a large number of underprivileged adults in our society who have never been to school or dropout. Eventually these adults get into begging or rag picking, petty thieving or become addicts as well. We offer an opportunity of de-addiction, earning to these adult through our vocational training program and opportunity of learning through Street Smart Program. We prepare these children to appear in the exams of NIOS to help them in re continuation of formal education.

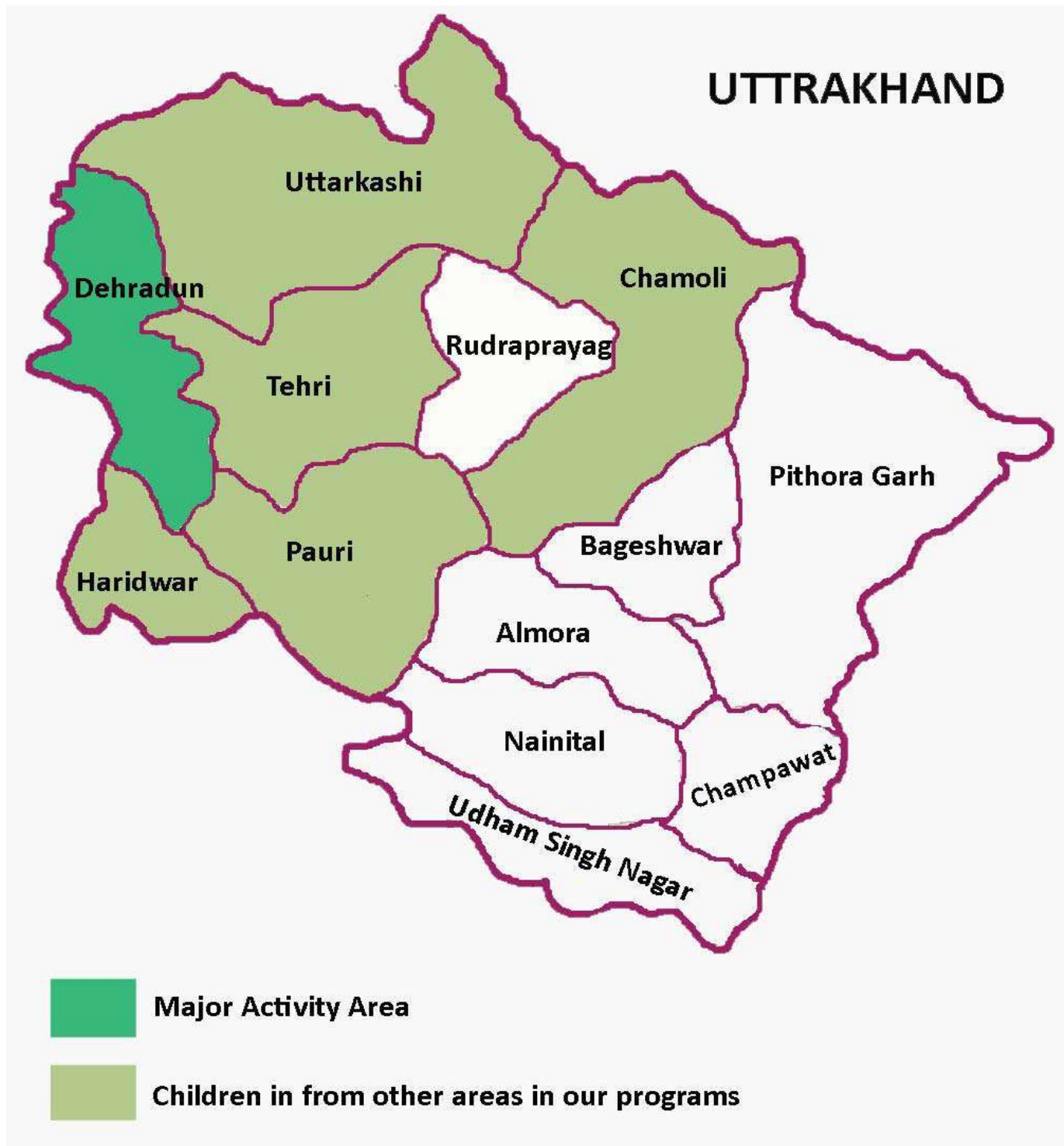
- **Legal identities for orphan and street children**

Having no shelter and living on the streets is the destiny of street children and orphans. They are always a victim of social abuse. They don't have recognition or respect. One of AASRAA's initiatives is to get the legal identities for these children. Even though it is complex to have legal identities of orphans and street children, we are in the process to acquire these through the Child Welfare Officers of the Police.

- **Support to the Govt. Junior High school, 55 Raipur Road, Dehradun**

Govt. Junior High School, 55 Rajpur Road, Dehradun has an honor of being the first middle school of Dehradun District. However, its historical importance has nothing to do with its present situation. The School has always been in a rented building. The current school building is dilapidated, older than 150 years, the roof about to fall sooner or later. Due to the effort of Mr. Hukam Singh Uniyal, a true humanitarian, the school has been given a new life. He made the effort of renovating the building personally. Only 3 students were physically present, when he was placed as the Head Master of the school and now the number has gone beyond 100. He started a residential program for underprivileged children; the school is running the only bridge course program under "**Sarv Siksha Abhiyaan**" in the State. AASRAA trust has helped the initiative by sponsoring the renovation of the roof, establishment of a new shelter, building toilets, rations and other facilities for residential scholars.

JOYN India is an integral partner, responsible for vocational training, giving the skills of **block printing and stitching** to make marketable products, market them and helps our young adults to earn as an alternative to rag picking or begging.

- **Doon Shelter Society**

AASRAA Trust runs its Street Smart Program in the premises of Rein Basera. Rein Basera is a shelter constructed by the Government for homeless people in the heart of the city, providing asylum to homeless at night and also helping to better lives for street children during daytime. This shelter, managed by the **Doon Shelter Society**, is used by AASRAA Trust for teaching street children and various work skills and crafts from 09 am to 06 pm. During evening, the shelter is used as a place for sleeping by the homeless. They are provided with quilts and a pair of blankets along with hot water for bathing and drinking water facility for a nominal charge of Rs.5/-.

- **Mountain Children Foundation**

The Mountain Children's Foundation (MCF), a nonprofit society, had its beginnings in the International Conference of Mountain Children (ICMC) held in Dehradun in May 2002. The MCF grew out of the UN's declaration of the year 2002 as the International Year of the Mountains and is inspired in part by the Global Movement for Children. The MCF's drive and energy come from the many social organizations, national and international, which for long have been in the service of children. The MCF continues to aggregate and synergize its efforts against the background of a growing concern for the fact that the percentage of children in the total population in most developing countries is on the rise. **MCF is helping us in our outreach program; one of their team members is a part of our outreach team every day.**

- **St Joseph's Academy**

St Joseph's Academy, one of the leading day schools, has allowed us to use their premises in the afternoon to run our **Wings of Doon** program.
